

Feedback from the Worship Questionnaire sent out to parents

Many thanks for all of you who found time to response to our recent questionnaire with a focus on Collective Worship.

They have been very useful for the Worship Governors to assess the quality of Collective Worship in school.

Below are some of the many, many comments which were submitted.

Q1. Why did you choose St. George's School for your child/ren?

'High Standards of teaching, excellent environment and very nice people involved with the school.'

"Excellent OfSTED report, had a 'good feeling' on the Open Day when two pupils showed us around."

Q2. What do you think that makes St. George's School distinctive?
