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READING AT ST GEORGE'S

In school we teach early reading using phonics. Phonics is a method used to teach children to decode words using graphemes (letters) and phonemes (sounds). This is taught from Reception through to Key Stage 1 and continuing into Key Stage 2 for those that need it. As children start to become more fluent we introduce them to VIPERS comprehension skills. LITTLE WANDLE LETTERS AND SOUNDS



Little Wandle Letters and Sounds is our new early reading phonics scheme and is a fantastic resources full of beautiful illustrations, pronunciations phrases and formation phrases for phonemes and graphemes. It also promotes high expectations for reading fluency, prosody (expression) and comprehension. VIPERS

VIPERS is an acronym to aid the recall of the 6 reading domains as part of the UK's reading curriculum. They are the key areas which we feel children need to know and understand in order to improve their comprehension of texts. VIPERS stands for

Vocabulary Inference Prediction Explanation Retrieval Sequence or Summarise To support your childrer

To support your children at home there are VIPERS question stems for each of these domains on your class page on the school website. These can be applied to any book your child is reading. Speak to your class teacher for more information.






Recommended reads
